**Ganieda Grove** has been in existence for nearly four years, emerging from the spiritual direction Ganieda Sanctuary, near Albany, WA

Since 1993 when it was founded, Ganieda Sanctuary has been running weekly and season sweatlodge rituals. Initially these were in the manner of the North American Indian tradition adapt for Australian circumstances, but have latterly been formulated as Sweat House Rituals based the Northern European spiritual traditions and in particular the advent of the Grove and to material from the OBOD course.

The Sweat House Rituals are an integral part of Ganieda and are run each week and at festitimes, accompanied by the appropriate ceremony at our stone circle on the Sanctuary.

Ganieda Sanctuary is a residential retreat, which we consider to be aligned to the druid tradition structure and direction, together with a strong healing emphasis as evidenced by the personal a professional training of its directors and others directly involved.

Ganieda is in the process of developing residential retreat programs not only for the Sanctuary, to also to be run elsewhere within Australia and eventually overseas. These programs are designed focus on health and personal development as a pathway to consciousness and spiritual evolution with the focus being particularly in our place in Australia and its spiritual development, as well within the global village.

IT IS WITH ENTHUSIAM that we announce that the Third Annual Australian Druid Assembly (1999) will held in South Australia, to be hosted by Cooringal Grove. This will mark the beginning of the next phase of the Assembly in Australia – which was always envisioned as being an event which would move from state to state being hosted by Druid-Grade members (whether in a Seed Group, grove, or solo) to enable the widest possist membership to take part.

Moving of the Assembly from state-to-state also serves the purpose of sharing the burden/costs of travel, eventually it is hoped that all states will act in the capacity as hosts.

However Bards or Ovates who are interested, should not fexcluded as they could organize an Assembly if they had a Druid grade member locally to assist them.

Any hosts for the year 2000? If you are interested, write a short note to N.E.A.Grove, who will serve to ordinate hosts as the event moves around Australia until some other arrangement seems more practicable.

If two or more members express interest in hosting the same year in the future we will put them in touch we each other so that they may decide who will act as host. Future plans regarding the Assembly will be discuss and decided during the Open Forum at this year's event. If you will be unable to attend but have a suggest you would like to offer, please send it to Serpentstar for inclusion in the September issue. The primary goal all of this is to maintain an Annual Event aimed at unifying OBOD members across this vast land.

# MAGIC AND DRUIDRY

Druid Spirituality, and all of the gifts that it offers, is essentially magical - but magical in a way that is concerned not so much with changing the outer world or future events, as with changing the individual. Druidry teaches the magic of personal and spiritual transformation.

For simplicity's sake, we can say that there are two kinds of magic; Folk Magic and Spiritual Magic 1. Folk magic's purpose is to effect changes in the physical world to alter the future. It includes weather working and healing: to bring good weather or to cure sickness. Sometimes, in the hands of unethical people, it can be used to curse rather than cure, to blight and hinder rather than encourage and benefit. Then it becomes 'black magic'. Spiritual Magic's purpose is the realisation of ideas in the world, through the spiritual and creative development of the magician. It offers ways of being of value to the world, of achieving wisdom, inspiration, knowledge, mystical union, and altered states of consciousness.

Although healing Folk Magic is used by Druids, the main focus of Druidry lies with Spiritual Magic. And although Druidry has some elements of shamanism and mysticism, and even psychotherapy within it, it is fundamentally different from these disciplines- it is in essence magical. Mysticism has as its goal union with the Divine. Shamanism has as its goal access to knowledge and help from the Otherworld, to heal and grow. Psychotherapy has as its goal the nurturing, healing and development of the Self. Druid magic has as its goals all these things, but something more too. It seeks conscious participation in the unfolding of life. At its heart is a way of discovering how we can co-create with life, of how we can open to our inherent creativity. This magic then becomes a way of 'making'- of making art, beauty, health, serenity, joy, ecstasy. It says we are not objects- to just be absorbed into the Divine, or healed, or perfected or improved. It says we are subjects-that we can consciously cooperate with life, with the Otherworld, with the Divine Plan. It says that we are unique beings, out of whom , can flow new creation. At the heart of this kind of magic lies the search for our creative potential, the search for Divine Inspiration that will help us give birth to something new in the world.

Many people see magic as a way of controlling and changing things by using hidden powers and magical forces. But Druid magic does not seek to change the future or reality in such a scientistic, manipulative way. It has a different approach — an approach that makes magic, not a quasi-science, by an art that is concerned above all with our creativity and our purpose in the world. Its aim is transformation, not manipulation.

1 There are many different kinds of magic, but apart from the stage magic of conjuring, they can be broadly divided into these two categories, which are sometimes called High Magic (Spiritual) as opposed to Low Magic (Folk).

This kind of magic is more feminine than masculine. When magic is treated like a science, it works in a linear, causal way in an attempt to change the future. This attempt can easily become unethical, since it uses power to try to manipulate and control, and even dominate. But when it is treated like an art, when its power is used not as power-over but a power-for, then it works in a non-linear way — it works acausally, beyond time and logic, generating the power to make and mend, to heal, to grow, to transform ourselves and the world.

This kind of magic is a gift of the Goddess-a secret known to the Celts and their magicians, the Druids. This magic is about daring to live life to the full. It's about opening to the deepest level of our hearts and souls and bodies. It's about learning how to use the energies that flow through out beings, for our own good and for the good of others too. It's about changing the software that runs our lives, opening to the Bigger Story that is trying to live through us. It's about taking a quest — a magical journey through Space and Time that brings us knowledge and wisdom, health and strength.



The visit in April to Mt Tomah was wonderful despite the cold wind. Five of us enjoyed the day rugged up in beanies and, gloves and heavy coats. The magic of the turning season was on show everywhere we looked.

The gardens are vast and on this trip we really only found our bearings, but we enjoyed discovering stands of Holly trees, Elders, Oaks, Alder and Beech trees, and a magical area of Herb and Rose Garden reached by walking between a Cornish Elm and a European Oak.

An interesting find was an Irish Yew, and there were other Yew trees that hid from us on this occasion.

We have learnt however that we can request and obtain a map of the Gardens with the plots indicated to make the Questing easier, and this will be published as soon as we obtain it.

Would it be possible for other members or groups to obtain this information from their local gardens and we can have perhaps a Sacred Tree Register for all states, and also a Register of Australian trees that members find particularly magic in their area.? There must be some beautiful Cold Climate trees in parts of the Southern States, i.e. Canberra, Victoria and some others in northern states.





# (eremony for ANZAC Day

One of our younger members was amazed at what his school called a service for ANZAC Day before the school holidays.

The children at the school were instructed to take a wreath, turn around and walk to the back wall of the hall. Wait there for the count of 9 and turn around and walk back to the front of the hall. Young Eli was upset at the lack of any real and meaningful participation in the ceremony for his Ancestors who fought and died in the war, so he wrote his own, which was preformed on ANZAC Day in the Machuld Haul Garrd Grove

We entered the Grove from the West and saluted the quarters in a sunwise manner. Standing in the East Eli asked the spirit of the Grove to bless the ceremony to honor the sacrifices made by all the Ancestors of this country in all past wars.

He then walked to the Southwest and lay sprigs of rosemary and other flowers on the Southwest stone, the place of the Ancestors in the Grove.

The following poem was read. It is about Arthur a Great Warrior. From The Island by Francis Brett Young.

Arthur is gone... Tristram in Careol Sleeps, with a broken sword - and Yseult sleeps
Beside him, where the westering waters roll
Over drowned Lyonesse to the outer deeps.

Lancelot is fallen. The ardent helms that shone
So knightly and the splintered lances rust
In the anonymous mould of Avalon:
Gwain and Gareth and Galahad all are dust!

Where do the vanes and towers of Camelot
And tall Tintagil crumble? Where do those tragic
Lovers and all their bright-eyed ladies rot?

and stood



# MOTTATION



And while we are speaking of special places, I would like to share experiences I have had using different herbal teas for meditations.

As a practicing herbalist I came across references of herbs used by Druids in "A Modern Herbal" by Mrs. M. Grieve. This was of course the first conscious step upon the Druid path for me, as I found that the herbs mentioned in the book, were herbs I often used in everyday practice. Having discovered their other attributes, I decided to use them as "meditation blends" and upon starting the O.B.O.D. course I found interesting

I would like to discuss first Vervain, Verbena officinalis, this most sacred and magical herb. Those who have read "A Druid Herbal" will know that Vervain is gathered at Midsummer when neither the sun nor moon is in the sky, just before flowering. Verbena is the classical name, given by the Romans for 'alter plants' in general and for this plant specifically. The Druids used it in their lustral water, and it was used as a charm around the neck against headaches and venomous bites.

Although it has multiple medicinal values, I used it mainly in practice for areas of stress in and around the lungs. These days Vervain is called up and used for stress related asthma, it will strengthen the nervous system and relax tension and stress and can be used to ease depression and melancholia

Because breathing is the start of meditation (for me) I decided the relaxing effect on the nervous system and increased capacity of the lungs due to the anti spasmodic effects, could make this an interesting tea for meditation purposes.

Taking a dessertspoon of the dried herb, I infused this in a teapot with a cup of boiling water for 10 to 15 minutes and drank this before my body of light and grove meditation.

I can definitely say that the Vervain was an aid in reaching a beautiful state of CLARITY in my meditations and I am still working to define the quality of this plant in this situation. I will share more of these Herbal meditations in forthcoming Newsletters.

Plants not only look after our material needs by nourish our spiritual growth and when treated with respect will always reply in kind. I would be interested in hearing from others who maybe are following a similar path.

\* Tip Always brew the whole herb, not tea bags, in a lidded pot or cup so that essential oils, which are often the active principle in the plant, are not lost in the steam
