
Much was discussed, and Australia seems part of the picture now. We are starting an exciting and ambitious project with Philip's approval and guidance; more next edition!

Earth News Sanctuaries

From Kathy Turner.

A new development in the Blue Mountains deserves mention in our tree register and this is the Canyon Sanctuary. Canyon Sanctuary is to be on the Canyon Colliery Coal Lease site, near Bell in the Blue Mountains. It has been planned and developed as a project over the last 2 years.

It will be on the 900 hectare, recently closed coal mining lease site, which includes magnificent head waters of the Grose River Valley. The area is a combination of richly diverse rain forest, with ferns and tall tree canopy.

The plateau areas are a mixture of low-growing eucalypts with an impressive diversity of associated species of flora. The native animals, once richly abundant, are all but wipe out by foxes feral cats and 200 years of white European, hopeless and predatory land management.


Feral predators will be excluded by perimeter fencing which will allow the native animals to flourish, will not impede the movement of natives, and will be virtually invisible in the spectacular, natural terrain.

The breathtaking sandstone cliffs, forming the canyons, dominate the landscape, just as they do in other parts of the blue Mountains including the Three Sisters.

To protect the fragile forest and canyon environment, and to ensure sustainable access, kilometers of raised boardwalk will be built, for ease of movement especially for elderly and disabled and ease of safety of viewing.

The native animals to be introduced to Canyon Sanctuary are all, and only, species, which belong to the area and are part of the rich bio-diversity which was present at the time of white settlement. These animals, including Bandicoots and Bettongs, Parma Wallabies, Brushtailed Rock Wallabies, Ring-tailed and Brushtailed Possums, Quells, Pademelons and Platypus will flourish again in their wild habitat in a dynamic, sustainable, balanced ecosystem.

Once plentiful Pademelons, grazed on undergrowth and leaf litter. The loss of the Pademelon heralded the start of big bushfires in the area.

Dear Serpentstar,

Have enclosed some information, which I though might be of interest.

I've been asked to write a play about 'conflicting cultures' and visiting these places was part of my research.

During my research I was fortunate enough to met an elderly woman who showed me places I didn't even know existed! It was a strange Odyssey.

During this time I was privileged to see some special stones A basket full of stones, which were in fact Aboriginal artifacts, possibly thousands of years old. One was about the size of a tennis ball and perfectly round. She said it was magic stone.

Yesterday we went to a place called Doolie Beal, the last gathering place of the depleted Wathawrong. This land......so hard to describe, how it felt walking through this deathly garden. I don't think I'll ever be the same again. It was quite an experience. The trees seem to be weeping. Some of them look to be well over 100 years old.

Yollinko Park is truly beautiful. I used to play there a lot when I was a kid. Fortunately the Barwon River is alive and thriving..

Barwon River environmental Trail.

The Barwon river trail allows you to discover the biological cultural and heritage values of the Barwon River between Rocky Point and Yollinko Park.

The walk takes you through

- Indigenous Grasslands which teem with reptiles, insects, small mammals and birds.
- Rocky Point, a granite outcrop from a molten lava flow 2 million years ago.
- Red River Gums, with new plantings to help with salinity problems and erosion control, as well as provide food and shelter for many native animals
- Balyang Sanctuary, where water birds nest and pied cormorants and egrets roost in the trees at dusk, and lorikeets and sulphur-crested cockatoos abound.
- 5. Habitat plants
- 6. Aquatic Life including freshwater shrimp, mussels,
- 7. Sandhoppers, demesfly nymph are to be found
- 8. The Yollinko Wetlands are a treasure to be found and explored
- Yollinko Park. At this ancient living site, you can experience the lifestyle of the Wathaurong tribe through sculptures and Aboriginal garden.

Yollinko Park Aboriginal Garden.

Here you can learn the history of the indigenous peoples of this area, and how they cared for and lived from, the land.

The garden is full of Bush Tucker, and is a good opportunity to learn about bush foods.

Victorian Aborigines used plants for the necessities of daily life. Australia wide there is over 900 species that are known to have been used for food, medicine, fiber, canoes, housing and all manner of implements.

Yollinko Park contains a selection of plants with a cross section of these uses.

All the plants have been collected locally and were once used by the indigenous people of the area, the Wathauron.

News From New Zealand from Bill Huddleston

We have been celebrating the eight festivals here in Whangarei for two years. It all began after I had returned from Britain having completed the Bardic and Ovate grades, and was asked to give a talk on Druidry to the local Theosophy group.

From that session a group decided to join in celebrating the festivals. The first was Alban Heruin in December 1996. We held it at a local rural property. We began with a gathering at the base of the hill where I explained a little about Druidry and the festival and we all shared a little of ourselves. We then made our way up to the top of the hill for the ceremony proper. We have basically been following the alternative ceremonies with adaptations, but more on that in a moment. The ceremony includes an eistedfodd and we had a great time singing dancing reciting poetry and telling stories. We then meandered down to a stream and threw into it rose petals with our hopes and desires.

At the completion we had a great shared feed and all received a shared gift. There were about thirty people present.

Since then we have varied in numbers. The least was 7 and the most 22. We have practicing Druids, Wiccans, Buddhists and anyone else who hears about us and wants to join in. Four of us have attended every ceremony and as we come to completing the second turning of these seasonal rituals, we are growing in a deepening of the great continuity of things. Three or four others have attended most. As you can see from this the group is, apart from a hard core of people, quite transitory. For us regulars this is exciting, as we never know what energies are going to come into the group each time.

We usually celebrate them in the country and have one property in particular where we like to go. The energies are building up in this place. It is easy to see how some of the sacred places I Britain connected with Druidry have such energies. Of course we have these places in New Zealand, as you will in Australia. Having been in Britain and being in some of these places I have personally been helped to know a little more deeply the specialness of these sacred places.

We have, of course had to adapt to the Southern Hemisphere. North/South orientation is reversed, as is the sunwise direction. We open our circles anticlockwise. We bring in references to our local place – plants etc. but have decided to keep some Northern Hemisphere references intact. These are in particular to do with some of the deep archetypal references such as the animals of the four quarters. This is, for us, a connection with our deeper spiritual heritage.

The wiccans in particular often bring in their own special things. So while we operate within the framework of the set ceremonies we do not adhere rigidly to them and certainly are not limited by them.

When we celebrate Alban Heruin on 21.12.98 we will have completed t30 complete circles. We will be holding it on a beach in Whangarei harbour. It is a special time as we are in that border place- the edge of the land and the sea. When we hold them in those sorts of places we feel special energies and are joined by many dancing 'people' who came to share in the joy and celebration of life we were enacting on the quiet beach.

As we have grown and developed our understandings of what works well, we have settled to making sure that each ceremony is structured in a threesome way. How this happens each time varies. We have also learned to make sure that every ceremony has the scope for every person to participate in ways that are meaningful for them. There is always lots of sharing, talking about things to let go, things to be going toward. There is always a place for these things to be enacted.

And of course it goes without saying we always end with a great feed.

I hope this has been of interest. I believe that it always helpful when we can share the things we are doing. Being a far-flung little group, sharing through communications such as Serpentstar must be encouraging and uplifting. I know I have begun to look forward to receiving Serpentstar as much as Touchstone.

Each day unraveled as a rose The petals soft and sweet. Our minds as eager and open As each flower and bee does meet.


Our leader, his threads are soft and sure

I had an idea in my head that I would sit with my back to the city as a symbolic gesture. When it came time to sit, I discovered I was not yet ready or able to turn my back on the city. So I sat facing the South across the valley. To my left was the once wilderness of the John Forrest National Park. To my right, largely obscured by a convenient granite outcrop, was another kind of wilderness.

The city. A dangerous labyrinth where the people are afraid. Afraid of each other, afraid of nature, afraid of darkness. In their fear, they have built another wilderness. A place where you cannot walk the open spaces for fear of being run down by a car, truck or train. The water tastes of chemicals, and the air is dirty.

The gentle sounds of nature, birds, trees, a buzzing fly, are erased by the constant roar of the traffic as people rush from one sanctuary to the next. Afraid of open spaces, they build one on top of the other, crowding ever closer.

The ground which feeds them is covered over and sealed off from sun and rain, as if the growth of a plant is offensive unless cultivated and manicured in neat rows, trimed and contained within its designated space.

There is a beauty in the randomness of nature which the perfct squares, circles, and straight lines of the city cannot touch. There is no balanced symmetry in the limbs of a tree as it responds to the sun's call and reaches ever skyward. The scattering of boulders on the hillside oposite is not laced evenly or in lines as the dwelling places they look out at. They cluster close together or spread out, a home for small animals, a place to sit and soak up the sun.

The tree moves gently in the breeze. It says to the breeze" I feel you, we are connected. I am moved by and with you. I would be less than I am without you". The breeze is cool and I shiver and think of warm places. I too am moved by the breeze. I rock back and forth gently, acknowledging it as the tree does.

I hear voices. Someone approaches. My quiet reverie is broken, my connection to wind and tree and earth fading. The men never arrive, the threat unimanifest but my reaction gives me food for thought. I am sitting enjoying the solitude/companionship of nature and I react with fear to men who are not even in sight. My fear speaks volumes of my own hurt and of society's greater hurt. Not only does the city and its institutions cut me off from the nature which sustains me, it also cuts me off from the other humans around me.

Who are my people, my tribe? The woman I share shelter and food with? The relatives I see only for weddings, funerals and "obligatory" visits? The people I work with? The men I sit with in the Sweatlodge? The people all over the planet I network with via computer and fiber optic communications?

All of these are my people, yet the connection with them is fragmented and tenuous, distorted and broken. My wife/husband relationship is strained by sex roles taught from birth and reinforced by society every day. The work place is opressive and competitive—boss against not-boss; not-boss against not-boss. The train ride is fraught with rituals of isolation: you should not look anyone in the eye; you musn't sit next to someone if you can sit apart from them.

The tree does not flinch and draw back when the crow stops to preen itself on an outsretched branch. The dried grasses which rustle together in the stream bed are not trying to avoid each other. The earth which gives birth to us, nourishes and supports us until it welcomes us with open arms at the time of our death.

I have a picture of a circle of standing stones on my wall at home. I imagine them to be a tribe dancing together hand in hand, until one of them steps forth and prophesies of the future; a future bleakwith

despair and aggression. A future people isolated from each other and their fellow beings, disconnected from the Earth and all that sustains them.

So I sit on the hillside, and I become aware of another circle: a granite outcrop, a tree blackened by Fire, a grass tree, a lichen covered rock, some dry grass, a zamia palm, some kangaroo shit, an ants nest and myself. If I look further, I can see myself part of a larger circle containing a flock of galahs, a sky scraper, an animal track, a family home, a dry stream bed and an areoplane.

Essences for the Journey

REALISATIONS.

I WROTE ABOUT THE Australian Native Essences by Sabian in an earlier Serpentstar, after presenting them in a workshop at the inaugural Southern Hemisphere Druid Assembly. At this year's Assembly I realised further their correspondences with Druidry – beyond the obvious, that they come from trees and are healing. Philip pointed out that Druids are lunar and stellar as well as solar. Although only the lunar range of essences is on the market so far, we also have a solar and stellar range, to bring us more and more into our light bodies, in a gentle progression.

And there are other connections. (Is there anything, really, but connection?) I sat next to Noel one morning at breakfast while he shared the wisdom of an oracle he had, card and a book. I glanced at the cover of the book and saw the word "Sabian". I almost grabbed it from him! We have named our essences after a group of beings who began communicating with us in the early days of our work, who identified themselves as the Sabian Management Trust. Noel's book was astrological and it happens that each essences has its astrological connections. The Sabians were a Mesopotamian esoteric brotherhood concerned with the wellbeing of the planet – evidently they still are!

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

There are exciting developments with the essences. We now have practitioner-distributors in four continents. A set of diagnostic cards has been developed by artist Penny Chesney, who is an essence practitioner. A sample set was on display at this years Assembly; they will be printed, with an accompanying booklet/ They depict the various "kingdom collectives"- animal, bird, mineral or plant as well as the tree – that each essence connects with. Someone said they would be lovely for expatriates, so redolent of Australia!

They originated as larger pictures intended as aids to meditation, for groups working with the essences on a regular basis for planthealing. As diagnostic cards, they enable the creation of highly individual "combination" essences for people's particular needs, help us identify the particular kingdom collectives whose counsel is relevant for us at the time.

The book "Tree Essences for the Journey" which was available at last year's Assembly gives the counsels of the tree spirits and the new book to go with the cards lists the counsels of all the other kingdom collectives, who have been asking that their voice theard.

THE PRESENT

For now, we make you a gift of the counsels of the tree. Each issue of Serpentstar over the next three issues, starting with this one, very give details of three essences, then the next issue will include four – as they follow the lunar months, 13 in all. It is most helpful to actually take the essences, which connect you very directly to all the associated kingdom collectives, and you receive their counsel integrated into your being on the energy level. If you want to do that, see contact details at the end of this Article.

Without physically taking the essences, you may nevertheless appreciate the words of wisdom from the trees. The devic counsel applies specifically to the waxing or active phase of the moon, during which the waxing essence brings things to the surface for healing; the tree spirit counsel to the waning or integration phase, in which the waning essence facilitates positive outcomes. There a also colour visualisations and musical notes, which help attune you to the energy – for these essences, involve all our senses.

Musical chant ("om") to the note of C. Colour: cobalt blue.

Adverse reactions (waxing phase0: Uncommunicative, flighty, unsure, living in the past.

Positive outcome (waning phase): Clarity in speech, focused, sure, understanding.

Devic Counsel (Overseeing Deva Mee Mee):

Positive outcome: Energetic, fulfilled, uplifting, connected to Universe.

Devic Counsel (Overseeing Deva Gi-Pai):

We are all connected forces, and we are the total, collective De4vic energetic of the Golden Wattle Feel our energy surrounding you. We create a cocoon effect around you,, revitalising your whole structure. As the Sun is our creative life force, she has allowed us to pass this on to you at a level designed for your exposure. Allow us to bring her closer! This is the warmth we all long for, creating a new phase, so when you break from your cocoons of golden light, you will then be at one in the Sun's likeness. Feel us, see us, know us; this is all we ask.

Tree Spirit Counsel (Tree Spirit Tal-Te):
There are many cycles ending and starting, always moving us to a new cycle. Like a cocoon, draw on my energy. Feel the Sun streaming down, touching your face, showering you with golden light. We come to express our femininity - that soft, gentle silkiness that you feel within your hearts, which is of the Silky Oak's Goddess- like essence. We look after this special tree, as she is sacred to woman's ritual or the feminine within. We bring into your hearts the warmth and wholeness that comes from believing in her. We help you to find your Selves, to feel your intuitive core within, your own Goddess-like essence. Love and honour is what we impart to you, linking us all closely to the Great Mother. Reach the Silky's Oak's heights easily, knowing you are mirrors of her beauty. Take a journey of love with your own sacred Goddess energies, which always bring you homeward with love. Tree Spirit Counsel (Tree Spirit Na-Be): This is the essence of inner beauty. My counsel is Self: belief in yourself and all around. Allow me to take you into your

Astrology from Alice



On the 22nd December 1998 we celebrate one of the four great solar festivals of the year. Our Capricorn festival celebrates the longest day and shortest night of the year for the Southern Hemisphere. It is our summer festival of good living, relaxing and spending as much time at the beach or in the country as we can. Christmas was originally designed to celebrate the birth of the Sun God in the Northern Hemisphere as at this time it heralded the turning point of winter at the longest night and shortest day of the year. In the Southern Hemisphere, it is a very good time to celebrate the joy of life, and that is exactly what most of us do.

Capricorn is connected to the planet Saturn and in astrological language Saturn is said to "rule" the zodiac sign Capricorn. I have noticed that Capricorn and Saturn people in the Southern Hemisphere are quite different to those the textbooks describe for the Northern Hemisphere. They are often big, fair people, instead of little dark people, and their sense of humour is very finely honed indeed, they tend to be the best raconteurs of funny stories and jokes that I have ever met. They still retain the dry sense of humour, the deadpan delivery and the rather taciturn nature of the Northern Hemisphere Capricorns, but seem to enjoy life a great deal more.

I think this may be because the Sun is shining through the earth zodiac sign of Capricorn during the Southern Hemispheres high summer, when the weather is very warm, the air is balmy and everybody tends to be outside enjoying nature.

I remember my Capricorn son as a baby spent a great deal of time at the beach or sleeping in his pram under a tree. He was taken into the sea when I brought him home from hospital after his birth, so he learned to swim from about 10 days old. I did feel this was very appropriate for a Capricorn, as the sign carries a very special symbol of the "Sea Goat" or the Goat with the tail of a fish. In the Northern Hemisphere, babies born in the sign Capricorn are born at the coldest time of the year.

Until quite recently they were dressed in heavy clothes and covered in tight blankets to keep warm, hence being programmed with a feeling of restriction and limitation about life at a very early age indeed.

In very ancient days, Capricorn and the day of Saturn, Saturday, were considered special times to celebrate the joy of life and the Saturn festival was a very lusty one indeed! We still follow this pattern with our great Christmas/New Year festival and by having most of our parties and weddings on a Saturday. Our children have their long summer holidays all during the sign Capricorn, and go back to school when the sun enters the sign Aquarius. Saturn is the planet connected to the structures of our life and our body.

It has an affinity to our skeletal system, skin and teeth. Our skeletal system keeps us erect; our teeth grind food for us and our skin keeps our body together, so Saturn is a very important planet to our well being. If the structures of our life are wrong or unbalanced, Saturn will try to show us where they are wrong through

bringing pain or difficulty in that area, if the structures of our life are built correctly, Saturn will bring considerable and lasting reward.

All the major solar festivals are derived from the time the Sun enters zero degrees of the Cardinal signs of Aries, Cancer, Libra and Capricorn. This is because the Cardinal signs are considered the beginning or activation of the seasons of the year.

The Aries festival is our celebration of autumn, the Cancer festival is our celebration of winter, the Libra festival the celebration of spring and the Capricorn festival the celebration of summer.

Astrologers calculate a chart for when the Sun moves to exactly zero degrees of these signs, at the location and place in which the astrologer is interested. This chart is then used as a prediction tool for that location for the following three months, until the next solar festival. The Aries and Libra festivals also indicate the time of equal length of day and night and are therefore called equinoxes. The Capricorn festival is the time of the longest day and shortest night in the Southern Hemisphere. The Cancer festival is the time of the shortest day and longest night in the Southern Hemisphere.

Australia has a particular affinity to the energy of Capricorn, as it became the Commonwealth of Australia on January 1 1901, when the Sun was about 10 degrees into the sign of Capricorn. For this reason the

Capricorn Ingress chart is usually very important. I have calculated a chart for 12.57 PM daylight

saving time in Canberra, as this is the time the Sun moved to zero degrees of Capricorn in that city. We use Canberra because it is the capital of Australia and is the place used for all predictions about what will happen in Australia generally.

At this time and place the Sun in the most prominent part of the horoscope, in the 10th sector of the chart and conjunct the Midheaven. It is also making a powerful flowing connection to its ruler Saturn and is moving towards Venus. This should benefit Australia during January, February and March and we may find it playing a prominent role in some way.

The Sun is also part of a novile pattern involving Uranus and Neptune, so the number 9 will be important for Australia over those 3 months. The novile pattern usually means the end or completion of something in preparation for a new beginning, so I would expect news of our Prime Minister, the Governor of Australia, or a very prominent figure in Australia resigning their position, or completing something of importance. This pattern can also bring about sudden successes or a turn for the better for our country. As the major directions indicated for Australia during this period is South and South East, perhaps we will find the south and = southeast part of our country emphasised, or Antarctica may be in the news. This chart does not make any direct connection to Australia's birth chart, so we should not have any major events during this period, but can stimulate areas connected to commerce, communication and transport generally

If you are familiar with Astrology it is good fun to compare your own chart to the Capricorn Ingress chart for your location, as this will show where your major activity will be and whether it will be an important time in your life, or just general living.
